3 Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 I note that the hour has come and
10 that a quorum of the Council is
11 present. This Council will now
12 come to order. All members have
13 taken their seats. All visitors
14 have retired to their seats outside
15 the rails.

16 Before proceeding, I will
17 ask all those present to please set
18 your cell phone to silent or
19 vibrate. And any sidebar
20 conversations, please take outside
21 the chambers.

22 At this time to give our
23 invocation this morning, the Chair
24 recognizes Imam Kenneth Nurideen-
25 Muhammad. He is here today as the

5 (Councilmembers, guests and
6 visitors rise.)

7 IMAM NURIDEEN-MUHAMMAD:

8 Good morning, everyone and peace be
9 unto you. We gather here today in
10 the chamber of the legislative
11 branch of our City, and we stand
12 before the Councilmembers who along
13 with we, the people, are all
14 citizens of the only first class
15 city in the Commonwealth of
16 Pennsylvania. So let's be first
17 class.

18 We acknowledge and
19 appreciate the efforts of this body
20 under the leadership of Council
21 President Kenyatta Johnson, and we
22 appreciate the invitation of
23 Councilman Nicolas O'Rourke. And

5 We ask Almighty God to
6 guide our leaders among those who
7 are guided, and to keep them firm
8 and steadfast on the right path.
9 Almighty God, safeguard and
10 preserve their efforts as they face
11 the challenges which confront our
12 City and our neighborhoods.

13 Almighty God, be the friend
14 and the protector needed as they
15 face the anxieties of what the
16 future may hold and as we all
17 grieve over the past, especially
18 the lives that are lost, damaged
19 and traumatized by senseless gun
20 violence.

21 Almighty God, bestow upon
22 us the resources and a more
23 equitable distribution of these
24 resources necessary to uphold our
25 responsibilities and obligations to

4 The ayes have it and the motion
5 carries.

6 The Chair will dispense
7 with the regular order of business
8 to recognize the guests and
9 visitors joining us in chambers
10 this morning. On behalf of all
11 members of City Council, we welcome
12 you to our Council session. We
13 appreciate you taking the time to
14 join us as we attend to the
15 legislative affairs of our city.
16 We certainly invite you to come
17 again.

18 At this time the Chair
19 recognizes Councilmember Nicolas
20 O'Rourke, who will present a
21 resolution honoring and
22 congratulating Sapphire Cristál,
23 Philly's own Crown Jewel, for
24 outstanding representations of
25 Philadelphia's unique queer

2 performance, art and drag scene

3 culture on MTV's RuPaul Drag Race.

4 Will Sapphire --

5 (Sapphira.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Would you please join us and

8 Nicolas O'Rourke at the podium.

9 Sapphira.

10 Joining Nicolas O'Rourke is

11 Councilmember Mark Squilla,

12 Councilmember Rue Landau,

13 Councilmember Cindy Bass,

14 Councilmember Nina Ahmad and

15 Councilmember Isaiah Thomas and

16 Councilmember Kathy Gilmore

17 Richardson.

18 The Chair recognizes

19 Councilmember O'Rourke.

20 (Councilmembers and guests

21 approach podium.)

22 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: Thank

23 you, Council President.

24 And good morning to all of

25 our colleagues, all of the viewing

2 public and the entire City of
3 Philadelphia. We are here to
4 celebrate a certified star.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: I
7 don't know if y'all can see the
8 folks in the back, but folks are
9 holding up signs and I see one that
10 says, Queen Sapphira. A queen is
11 here and I'm definitely not talking
12 about Elizabeth or Latifah, she
13 thought she counts though too, a
14 hopeful RuPaul's Drag Race champion
15 and already the winner in of the
16 hearts of Philadelphians, Philly's
17 Supreme Drag Queen Ms. Sapphira
18 Cristál.

19 Some of you know that the
20 Season 16 Finale of Drag Race, 16
21 seasons of Drag Race airs tomorrow.
22 And I'll say it for all of us here.
23 Sapphira, we are rooting for you.
24 Now, it really shouldn't be a
25 surprise that the first queen to

2 represent Philly's drag scene on
3 the show is in the finals. She's a
4 singular talent who comes from a
5 community that fosters such
6 greatness.

7 The rest of the country's
8 been introduced to a figure many
9 Philadelphians have been privileged
10 to have front-row seats for. That
11 said, I do imagine that when it
12 comes to getting some tickets to
13 see Sapphira, yesterday's price is
14 not today's price. And more power
15 to you for that, ma'am.

16 Now, I don't want to dampen
17 the mood here, but I do want to
18 remind all of us that there is a
19 very serious aspect to these
20 festivities. In celebrating today,
21 we are also honoring Black queer
22 resistance. It's only right and
23 apropos that we speak the name
24 O'Shea Sibley into the record, a
25 young Philly native, a Black gay

2 man who you'll remember was
3 attacked and killed last year.

4 Sibley was defending his
5 friends who were confronted when
6 taking part in the same expression
7 of culture, dance, which we're here
8 to celebrate today. Everything I
9 know about LGBTQIA's history is
10 tinged with that mixture of joy and
11 pain, sunshine and rain, sometimes
12 even simply being has been an act
13 of resistance itself, yielding
14 sweet and bitter dividends.

15 Today in this space, in
16 this City and henceforth and
17 forever more we're here to
18 recognize and celebrate LGBTQIA
19 resistance and affirm our neighbors
20 for living out loud, being who they
21 were born to be and looking pretty
22 damn good at doing it.

23 And who does that better
24 than Philly's Crown Jewel. I can
25 think of no other. And it doesn't

2 seem like much of a stretch to say
3 that the nation agrees. Can we put
4 our hands together and congratulate
5 again Sapphira Cristál.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: This
8 might be my favorite day in Council
9 so far. I am beyond excited to
10 honor the incredible talent of
11 Sapphira Cristál, a powerhouse
12 Black drag queen from Philly who is
13 captivating audiences on RuPaul's
14 Drag Race.

15 As Philly's first openly
16 LGBTQ person elected to City
17 Council, it is my honor to
18 celebrate and uplift the Black
19 LGBTQ community who have long been
20 leaders and change-makers in our
21 city. Sapphira Cristál's success
22 is a testament to the power of
23 being absolutely true to one's
24 self, and I am thrilled to
25 recognize her achievements during

2 our Council session.

3 Let us continue to support
4 and uplift Black voices and Black
5 LGBTQ people in our community, both
6 on and off the stage. I know that
7 you will all be watching with me
8 tomorrow night as Sapphira brings
9 it home to Philly and on to
10 victory.

11 Sapphira, I am so happy to
12 have been getting to know you, to
13 have you in my life. I will tell
14 you have made Philly so proud and
15 we cannot wait to celebrate with
16 you. You are a dream. Sapphira is
17 the whole package. She is all of
18 the talent, the brains, the beauty
19 and has the great soul and great
20 heart to go with it. We are so
21 lucky to have her in Philadelphia.

22 So with that, I will now
23 pass this along to Tyrell Brown,
24 Executive Director of GALAEI.

25 MR. BROWN: Good morning,

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 everybody. So my name is Tyrell
3 Brown. I use they, them pronouns
4 and I'm the Executive Director of
5 GALAEI and also the Program
6 Director of Philly Pride 365. And
7 I was asked to come here this
8 morning to talk a bit about why
9 organizations that are Black- and
10 Brown-run are important to lifting
11 up talents such as this and
12 cultivating spaces for talent like
13 this to grow and expand.

14 I'm lucky and blessed to
15 have a staff -- I'm a little bit
16 emotional right now -- because we
17 in the community work so hard every
18 single day to be able to celebrate
19 moments like this. And I'm lucky
20 to have a staff. Four of them are
21 performers and producers.

22 We have DDA, who's working
23 on her fourth album right now. We
24 have Hazel also Luna,
25 D'Jawnette(ph), icon Ebony Fierce

2 who is not here right now and
3 Allyria Everlasting. We are an
4 organization of queer and trans
5 Black and Brown people, completely
6 queer- and trans-run.

7 We're located up in
8 Kensington in a heart of a lot of
9 tension right now, and we cultivate
10 a space for people to be able to
11 celebrate who they are no matter
12 where they're coming from. And we
13 cultivate a safety net for them to
14 be able to thrive and to grow into
15 stars that we are celebrating like
16 Sapphira here today.

17 I was recently given a
18 thank you by one of my staff
19 actually just yesterday. And what
20 she shared with me was that her art
21 and her performance is now informed
22 by a kind of activism that wasn't
23 there before and why it's so
24 necessary that we have spaces such
25 as GALAEI, such as Colours and so

2 many others to be able to lay a
3 foundation so that art means more
4 than just dressing up.

5 It means that we are
6 telling the stories about the
7 experiences that we have every
8 single day, every single day of our
9 life, whether or not that is
10 because we are dealing with
11 violence intracommunity or outside
12 of the community, whether or not we
13 are surviving poverty and so many
14 other intrasectional challenges
15 that we have to overcome just to
16 smile each and every day.

17 And we are happy now that
18 we have something to smile about
19 and we will have something to smile
20 about going forward when we
21 celebrate Sapphira tomorrow,
22 throughout the summer and for 365
23 days of the year of every year
24 going forward.

25 And that also means

3 performance, it's not just about
4 celebrating the beauty. It's also
5 about celebrating the people who we
6 are when all of that is stripped
7 away, who we exactly are as
8 community members, neighbors,
9 friends, family and often times we
10 reach to our organizations, GALAEI
11 and so many others, because the
12 doors to public institutions are
13 unsafe or we've been turned away or
14 there's just not enough resources,
15 and we are that bottom line there.
16 We can't afford to put it down.

17 So when the doors are
18 closed there, we don't have a
19 choice but to dig our heels in.
20 Sometimes it takes taking money out
21 of our own stores to make sure that
22 people don't go unhoused, so that
23 food is on the table and food is in
24 the cupboard and that is something
25 that we're called to do.

2 We don't get funded enough.

3 We don't have enough in our

4 salaries sometimes to make all

5 these things happen and that's

6 okay. It's not okay, but we're

7 going to have to make it okay right

8 now. But I think what's most

9 important is that the mission that

10 we serve every single day is one

11 that lifts up talent, lifts up

12 dreams and does it in an authentic

13 way.

14 And, Sapphira, you are the

15 embodiment of authenticity. Your

16 heart, what you bring to the stage

17 isn't just a performance. It's who

18 you are in here that inspires so

19 many people. And I'm so proud of

20 you, I'm so proud of you. I'm so

21 proud of the example that you're

22 setting for so many people in

23 Philadelphia. And I'm so proud of

24 every single person that is here

25 with us to lift you up. And I

2 can't wait to do more with you

3 going forward.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE: Thank

6 you very much, Tyrell.

7 Will our colleagues taking

8 part in the presentation now please

9 order yourselves. I think we are

10 ordered. Are we ordered? Okay.

11 Thank you. All right.

12 With that, we'll now read

13 the resolution. Whereas Sapphira

14 Cristál is a classically-trained

15 opera singer, composer and drag

16 queen with a six octave vocal

17 range. Sapphira Cristál was born

18 in Houston, Texas, began performing

19 in drag while studying music at the

20 Conservatory in Rochester in 2009

21 and has called Philadelphia home

22 since 2014, and whereas Sapphira

23 Cristál holds 14 drag pageant

24 crowns, including Miss America

25 2020, 2021 and has performed

2 nationwide. In 2014, she won the
3 title of Miss Everything upon
4 moving to Philadelphia; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

6 Whereas Sapphira Cristál is a
7 member of the drag queen girl group
8 Philly's Foxes, together with
9 fellow drag queens, Maria Topcat,
10 Iris Spectre, Omyra Lynn, Poison,
11 Mary D'Knight and Zsa Zsa St. James
12 with show DJ Chris Urban, and
13 whereas Sapphira Cristál has
14 appeared twice at the Philly
15 Friends Festival, first in 2019
16 when she sang on the same stage as
17 Stephanie Blight and again in 2023
18 when she was featured as a
19 headlining artist; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

21 Whereas Sapphira Cristál is
22 representing Philadelphia on the
23 globally televised show RuPaul's
24 Drag Race, an MTV show in which
25 drag queens compete to win the

2 crown and title of America's Next
3 Drag Superstar.

4 After applying to be a
5 contestant on the show 11 times,
6 Sapphira was cast on Season 16 of
7 the show, which premiered on MTV on
8 January 5, 2024 and is airing
9 through the spring; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas
11 Sapphira Cristál became an early
12 strong competitor on her season,
13 winning the Mini challenge, Maxi
14 challenge and the --

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: --
17 right, and the lip sync all in the
18 first episode, and whereas Sapphira
19 Cristál carries on Philadelphia's
20 strong legacy of Black opera
21 performers, making this tradition
22 her own by incorporating her
23 signature stunt queen elements of
24 drag into her live operatic
25 performances, like sliding slowly

2 into the splits while singing --

3 you're going to do that today?

4 And --

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: I

6 don't do splits but -- whereas

7 Sapphira Cristál works throughout

8 the City and nationwide to inspire

9 young people through appearances at

10 colleges, youth camps and high

11 schools. She taught several years

12 of master classes in drag makeup

13 and performance at Emerson College,

14 and she has given artist talks at

15 Rockland Community College.

16 An experienced attitude and

17 stage presence coach, Sapphira has

18 also taught master's classes at the

19 Philadelphia Burlesque Academy and

20 various dance studios, and whereas

21 Philadelphia City Council

22 recognizes the deep and valuable

23 experience of providing queer art

24 space and community in the City of

25 Philadelphia and honors Sapphira,

2 let's pop that champagne, Cristál
3 for showcasing our city as a space
4 that welcomes queer arts of color;
5 and

6 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Popping
7 champagne, okay. Whereas Sapphira
8 Cristál's success will inspire new
9 generation of our City's queer
10 youth of color to seek out queer
11 spaces, arts and other community
12 activities, and whereas the City of
13 Philadelphia City Council declares
14 Sapphira Cristál is a walking,
15 talking, moving miracle and
16 Philly's own Crown Jewel.

17 Now, therefore be it --

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: And
20 now be it resolved that the Council
21 of the City of Philadelphia honors
22 and congratulates Sapphira Cristál,
23 Philly's Crown Jewel, for her
24 outstanding representation of
25 Philly's unique queer performance,

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 art and drag scene culture on MTV's
3 RuPaul's Drag Race. Be it further
4 resolved that an engrossed copy of
5 this resolution be presented to
6 Sapphira Cristál as evidence of the
7 admiration and respect of this
8 body.

9 And now, I would like to
10 invite Sapphira Cristál, Philly's
11 Crown Jewel, to say a few words.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. CRISTÁL: Wow. Y'all
14 have me up this early time in full
15 drag -- well, kind of sort of. I
16 was tearing up over here because
17 you don't really know what's
18 happening, but this is quite the
19 opportunity. This is quite the
20 honor. This is a beautiful space,
21 and I just want to take it in and
22 accept it and thank you all for
23 your love, your support, your
24 admiration for seeing me.

25 You go on national

2 television and you just try to be
3 yourself, and you put yourself on
4 the line to be criticized, to be
5 seen. And whatever people see is
6 what they see. And some people see
7 you. And the great amount of
8 people who have shared with me
9 their stories because of me being
10 able to share my story and who have
11 thanked me because they too are
12 slue-foot, for saying I accept this
13 thing about myself, for talking
14 about my father and the struggles
15 that I had with him.

16 I lead with forgiveness,
17 with compassion, with kindness and
18 with love. And I think that in
19 this world we need a lot more of
20 all of that. And I think that
21 we -- I also got a lot of messages
22 being like, why did you make Maya's
23 dress. And I said to them, look,
24 if someone comes to me and asks me
25 for help, I'm going to provide that

2 help because that's the way that I
3 was raised.

4 And quite frankly that's
5 the way -- I moved, I was in
6 Rochester. Great city, love it.
7 Then Boston, different. I would
8 say that I learned a lot in Boston.
9 I was forced in fire there. But
10 when I got to Philadelphia, it was
11 the first time that I felt like I
12 was back home.

13 (Applause.)

14 MS. CRISTÁL: I didn't have
15 to live in fear anymore. I was
16 homeless in Boston. It was scary,
17 but I had God with me the entire
18 time so I wasn't that scared. But
19 when you finally get to a place
20 that allows you to really grow --
21 you earlier talked about the
22 sunshine and the rain. The rain
23 helps the flowers grow.

24 And so, I was able to take
25 all of what I've learned, took me

22 three minutes to speak. However,
23 due to today's volume, the time
24 limit may vary from session-to-
25 session. And today's time limit

2 will be two minutes. In order to
3 be fair to all those wishing to
4 speak, I intend to hold faithfully
5 to the two-minute limit.

6 When you begin speaking,
7 you will see a green light on the
8 podium when there are 30 seconds
9 remaining to your time. The light
10 will turn yellow, which is your
11 reminder to conclude your remarks.
12 Once two minutes has passed, the
13 light will turn red and the
14 Sergeant-at-Arms will disconnect
15 the microphone.

16 At that point, please yield
17 the podium to the next speaker if
18 you have not already done so. I
19 also reserve the right pursuant to
20 our rules of Council to limit
21 repetitious comments on the same
22 matter.

23 I will now ask the Chief
24 Clerk to please read the name of
25 our first speaker.

3 Representative Elizabeth Fiedler
4 for Solar Schools Act.

5 (Witness approached
6 podium.)

7 STATE REPRESENTATIVE

8 FIEDLER: Thank you so much for
9 having me here today. Thank you,
10 Council President. And thank you
11 to Philadelphia City Council for
12 your warm welcome. I am State
13 Representative Elizabeth Fiedler.
14 I am proud to represent the 184th
15 District in South Philadelphia.

16 I want to extend a special
17 thank you to Councilmember Gilmore
18 Richardson and Councilmember
19 Gauthier for introducing a
20 resolution today in support of a
21 piece of legislation that I have
22 worked on for over a year.

23 This is legislation I am
24 very passionate about and I am so
25 excited after traveling the state

2 to have the opportunity to bring it
3 home to Philadelphia. For just
4 over a year I have been working on
5 a project called Solar for Schools,
6 House Bill 1032.

7 Solar for Schools would
8 help schools in Philadelphia and
9 across the Commonwealth install
10 solar panels on the roof or if they
11 have land next to the building.
12 These solar panels would help the
13 schools generate their own
14 electricity. If you didn't know,
15 energy is the second highest cost
16 for school districts, a very big
17 price tag when they're trying to
18 balance their budgets and when
19 energy costs keep rising.

20 When schools generate their
21 own electricity, it helps them to
22 be able to not just save millions
23 of dollars but to have financial
24 stability and to be able to budget
25 for decades to come. Solar energy

2 would boost our production of
3 renewables, it would create good
4 union jobs and it would help us to
5 be part of the growing green energy
6 movement.

7 Under our legislation Solar
8 for Schools, the cost to schools
9 would be minimal. The state would
10 cover 50 percent of project costs
11 while the Federal Inflation
12 Reduction Act would cover 30 to 50
13 percent. I am proud to report that
14 this legislation passed the State
15 House with strong bipartisan
16 support back in June and now awaits
17 a vote in the Senate.

18 I am also incredibly proud
19 that Solar for Schools has the
20 support of labor, environmental,
21 education and faith groups across
22 our City and across the
23 Commonwealth. I will say finally
24 that I know we are no strangers to
25 the school funding crisis that

2 affects our schools here in

3 Philadelphia.

4 This is incredibly personal

5 to me as the parent of two Philly

6 public school kids who are sitting

7 in class right now. They asked me

8 where I was going today. And I

9 proudly told them that I would get

10 to be speaking with our City

11 Council colleagues today about

12 Solar for Schools.

13 Our schools need so many

14 improvements to their physical

15 buildings and they need to be

16 equipped for the dramatic weather

17 events to come as temperatures

18 rise. We believe that House Bill

19 1032, Solar for Schools, is an

20 important piece of that pie. It's

21 a money-saving program for schools

22 and another toolbox in the toolkit

23 of the Philadelphia School District

24 to be able to fund building

25 repairs, increase staff, fund

2 educational opportunities and more
3 while contributing to a healthier
4 planet.

5 Thank you so much to
6 Philadelphia City Council for your
7 support today and for your support
8 of schools, students, workers and a
9 greener city. I appreciate your
10 time.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Elowyn Corby
13 for Solar Schools Act.

14 (Witness approached
15 podium.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Can Elaine
17 McGuire and Shannon Crooker also
18 make their way to the podium
19 please.

20 MS. CORBY: Thank you so
21 much for having me. Thank you to
22 Representative Fiedler for leading
23 the effort to advance this
24 important legislation in
25 Harrisburg -- oh, better. Okay.

2 Can you hear me, great. And to
3 Councilmembers Gilmore Richardson
4 and Gauthier for introducing this
5 resolution in support of Solar for
6 Schools.

7 My name is Elowyn Corby and
8 I am the Mid-Atlantic Regional
9 Director for Vote Solar and Vote
10 Solar Action Fund. We are a
11 nonprofit that works state-by-state
12 to accelerate 100 percent clean
13 energy transition that puts the
14 interests, health and well-being of
15 people at its center, and we are
16 proud to lend our voice and support
17 of this important legislation.

18 Solar energy can lower the
19 cost of living, create local jobs,
20 reduce health-harming pollution and
21 build a brighter, more resilient
22 future for generations to come.

23 And what better way to invest in
24 those future generations than to
25 make it easier for schools to model

2 the future we want to see.

3 Our schools deserve all of
4 the support we can give them and
5 helping them to become hubs for
6 clean energy generation, education
7 and resilience is a goal worth
8 fighting for. A 100 percent clean
9 energy system is now an achievable
10 reality thanks to technological
11 advances, a rapidly falling cost of
12 renewable energy which is now the
13 most affordable energy to bring
14 onto the grid, and overwhelming
15 support from people across the
16 country, including here at home in
17 Pennsylvania where our 2022 polling
18 showed that over 80 percent of
19 Pennsylvanians support rooftop
20 solar. That's not even to begin
21 talking about the incredible
22 federal investments in clean energy
23 that are now helping us to
24 accelerate the transition.

25 Helping our schools to go

2 solar is a perfect way to invest in
3 clean jobs, increase resiliency,
4 save schools money which can then
5 be invested in other critical
6 programs. So excited to be here
7 today. Thank you for your time and
8 I'm excited for this legislation
9 that will help our children to
10 literally experience the clean
11 energy future that we are working
12 together to build. Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Elaine
15 McGuire. And can Shannon Crooker
16 and Taussy Valcarcel also make
17 their way to the podium.

18 (Witness approached
19 podium.)

20 MS. MCGUIRE: Good morning.
21 My name is Elaine McGuire, proud
22 member of IBW Local 98. As a proud
23 resident of Pennsylvania, I
24 wholeheartedly support House Bill
25 Solar for Schools. This initiative

2 not only promises to pave the way
3 for a cleaner, greener future for
4 our communities but also serves as
5 a beacon of hope for our local
6 economy and workforce.

7 By implementing solar
8 energy systems in schools across
9 the state, we not only reduce our
10 carbon footprint but also create
11 invaluable job opportunities for
12 our skilled workers, including the
13 members of IBW Local Union 98.
14 These electricians known for their
15 expertise and dedication stand
16 ready to put their talents to work,
17 ensuring the successful
18 installation and maintenance of
19 solar panels in our educational
20 institute.

21 Moreover, this bill offers
22 a much-needed boost to our school
23 districts injecting new life into
24 their budgets and resources as our
25 communities continue to strive for

2 sustainability and resilience.
3 Investing in solar energy for
4 schools is a crucial step forward.
5 Let's embrace this opportunity to
6 support local jobs, empower our
7 residents and build a brighter
8 future for generations to come.
9 Thank you.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Shannon
11 Crooker. Can Taussy Valcarcel and
12 Paul Birdsong also make their way
13 up.

14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 MS. KROCKER: Good morning.
17 My name is Shannon Crooker. I'm
18 with Generation 180, a nonprofit to
19 inspire and equip schools to go
20 solar. All schools and communities
21 in Pennsylvania regardless of their
22 geography, wealth or size should
23 have access to clean, affordable
24 energy.

25 We monitor and track the

2 solar schools movement and just
3 released a report that indicated
4 that solar had nearly tripled on
5 schools in Pennsylvania in the last
6 decade. That sounds like a lot and
7 it is. It's 39 megawatts, which is
8 enough to power 7,000 homes in
9 Pennsylvania.

10 To put that into relation,
11 here in Philadelphia there are over
12 700,000 homes. That's only 1
13 percent of homes that could be
14 powered by solar energy through our
15 schools. We demand more. We
16 expect more and we would love to
17 see more schools reap the benefits
18 of clean energy. Because not only
19 would they save money and create
20 cleaner environments, healthier
21 environments, they are also able to
22 learn directly from the energy and
23 enhance their curriculum and
24 develop workforce development
25 programs for their students and

2 create an onramp for students to
3 get jobs in the solar energy, which
4 provides family-sustainable wages.

5 We urge you to support this
6 as residents of Philadelphia, as
7 Councilmembers who represent the
8 constituents here. Not only could
9 Philadelphia be put on the map and
10 enable more schools to go solar
11 through Representative fiedler's
12 amazing program, Solar for Schools,
13 schools across Pennsylvania would
14 be able to benefit and invest in
15 what matters, the students, their
16 buildings and the future. I thank
17 you.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Taussy
20 Valcarcel. Paul Birdsong and then
21 Fred Motley.

22 MS. VALCARCEL: Good
23 morning, everybody. Good morning,
24 everybody. I'm here to speak about
25 the Resolution of 240286. Good

2 morning. My name is Taussy
3 Valcarcel. I'm an activist Afro-
4 Latina in the Panther Party and
5 concerned citizen from
6 Philadelphia.

7 I would like to thank the
8 great men and women who has taken
9 the challenge and risk of
10 redevelopment in our city. But
11 hear me out, City Council. Our
12 streets are bleeding hard and I
13 would like for you to rethink hard.
14 How we want to rebuild our city.
15 Instead of rebuilding the
16 buildings, we should rebuild our
17 community.

18 Do we need new buildings,
19 stores to keep in the property or
20 do we need our sanity, integrity,
21 respect to rebuild our brotherly
22 powerful people united and in
23 peace. What we really want and
24 need is closure for the mothers
25 that are waiting for an answer from

2 the forensic labs. And one more
3 thing, leave the unions alone. All
4 power to the people.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Paul
7 Birdsong, Fred Motley and Lamont
8 McDowell.

9 MR. BIRDSONG: My name is
10 Paul Birdsong. I'm the National
11 Ambassador for the Panther Party
12 New Age, not to be confused with
13 the New Black Panther Party. As
14 our forefathers previously stated,
15 the original Black Panther Party
16 for defense, there's no legitimacy
17 to the New Black Panther Party and
18 we don't have anything to do with
19 it.

20 Now that I've said that,
21 I'm here to speak on the same bill
22 as the sister, the same resolution.
23 It's funny how we focus on making
24 new buildings and new businesses.
25 And I know from doing this in other

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 states that there's a live-stream
3 that Mayor Cherelle Parker is
4 watching, right, so I know she sees
5 what I'm saying and hears me.

6 We don't need to continue
7 to build businesses in the unsafe
8 community. We don't need to
9 continue to try to lure people here
10 to spend money just so they can owe
11 you when they have to leave because
12 it's unsafe. We don't need to
13 continue to work on the
14 infrastructure that's made out of
15 stone. We need to work on the
16 infrastructure that's made out of
17 people.

18 We don't need to redevelop
19 the buildings over there on 53rd
20 Street between where the shootings
21 happened at the Eid celebration and
22 the shootings on Chancellor and
23 53rd. Why are we working on them
24 buildings instead of working on the
25 people. I still don't see that

2 civilian force out there.

3 I still don't see a
4 forensics lab that is not obsolete.

5 We don't need none of that. We
6 need to work on the people of
7 Philadelphia. The City of
8 Brotherly Love, right, but all our
9 brothers keep killing one another.
10 That's what we need to work on.

11 So until that forensics lab
12 is available and when it actually
13 works and until we stop making
14 resolutions and bills about
15 buildings instead of people, the
16 Panther Party will continue to
17 come. We won't just come here.
18 We're going to start coming to the
19 offices. We're going to get less
20 and less friendly until the people
21 become the priority.

22 I don't care about people
23 saying give us numbers. I don't
24 care about the mic. I don't care
25 about none of this stuff we're

2 doing outside. I don't care about
3 the circuses we turn this place
4 into every Thursday morning,
5 celebrating stuff while people are
6 out here dying. I care about
7 what's happening to the people.

8 And like the sister said,
9 leave the unions alone and leave
10 the people who are part of the
11 union alone.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. BIRDSONG: We're
14 fighting for this and we fighting
15 with them too. All power to the
16 people.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Fred Motley,
19 Lamont McDowell, then Carlton Epps.

20 (Witnesses approached
21 podium.)

22 MR. MOTLEY: For the
23 record, my name is Fred Motley.
24 For the past decade, I've been a
25 dedicated cook at Aramark in all

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 three houses -- all three stadiums
3 in South Philly. In September I
4 found myself facing a medical
5 mishap that had been causing me a
6 lot of stress. I must have health
7 care coverage to address this issue
8 and ensure my well-being.

9 Additionally, I have a son
10 who's right now recovering from an
11 aneurism and a stroke, both of
12 which occurred simultaneously in
13 2009 at the age of 2-and-a-half.
14 Despite these challenges, we've
15 managed to navigate his recovery
16 journey with therapy and health
17 Care. However, it hasn't been easy
18 because I had to basically pay out
19 of my own pocket.

20 I love the job at Aramark,
21 but there have been moments when
22 I've had to make tough choices
23 between essential expenses, my
24 son's therapy, primary, rent also
25 primary. It shouldn't be this way.

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 With a company as large as Aramark,
3 for workers to only be offered a
4 \$0.25 raise is ridiculous. We
5 shouldn't have to struggle to
6 afford basic health care
7 necessities. We need family-
8 sustaining wage increases.

9 Aramark has the power to
10 make a difference in our lives by
11 providing us with the wages and the
12 health care that we need. We're
13 not asking for the world. We're
14 just asking for an opportunity to
15 live healthy lives without constant
16 financial worry.

17 It is an honor to be here
18 amongst these hollowed halls.
19 Thank you for your time and for
20 standing with our Aramark workers.
21 Thank you very much.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Lamont
24 McDowell, Carlton Epps and then
25 Rosslyn Wuchinich.

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. McDOWELL: Good
3 morning. My name is Lamont
4 McDowell. And I'm a cook for
5 Aramark at Wells Fargo Center and
6 the Lincoln Financial Field. I
7 stand before you not only -- I
8 stand before you not only as a
9 worker but as a proud resident of
10 Philadelphia, a city where life can
11 be often be challenging.

12 I believe in the value of
13 hard work. I take pride in the
14 meals I prepare, the smiles I bring
15 to fans and the memories I create
16 for fans at the stadiums. But the
17 truth is the wages I currently earn
18 are simply not enough to keep up
19 with rising costs. The cost of
20 living in Philadelphia is high and
21 without health care, the burden is
22 heavy.

23 I went on strike with my
24 coworkers last week, not only for
25 myself but for the countless others

2 who like me are struggling to make
3 ends meet. Since this strike,
4 Aramark has yet to make health care
5 more accessible to us. I have
6 conditions that I haven't been able
7 to get checked in several years
8 because I don't have health
9 insurance.

10 This isn't just about a
11 paycheck. It's about my health, my
12 well-being and my life. In 2015 I
13 lost my father and my fiancée
14 within one month of each other.
15 The pain of their absence is
16 sometimes something I carry with me
17 every day. But despite the
18 hardships, I continue to persevere
19 because my mother needs me. And I
20 know that I'm not alone.

21 This resolution to support
22 Aramark workers mean a lot to me
23 and having all of you at the City
24 Council standing with us means even
25 more to me. Thank y'all.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Carlton Epps,
3 then Rosslyn Wuchinich and Katie
4 Bartolotta.

5 (Witnesses approached
6 podium.)

7 MR. EPPS: Good morning,
8 Council President, esteemed members
9 of City Council and all guests
10 here. My name is Carlton Epps and
11 I work at all three stadiums for
12 Aramark. I'm here to talk about
13 the disrespect that Aramark is
14 giving us during our negotiations.
15 Not only to us, but the disrespect
16 that they give to all residents of
17 this wonderful state of
18 Pennsylvania that we live in.

19 During our negotiations,
20 the lawyer was asked how does he
21 feel about majority of our workers
22 who we get our health care through
23 government-assisted programs. I
24 get mine through the Marketplace,
25 Pennie as we call it now in

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Pennsylvania.

3 When asked this question
4 about how we're working for a
5 multi-billion dollar company -- and
6 you can quote me on his response --
7 he was asked how does he feel about
8 that. He said, so. Literally
9 that's what he said to us. Some of
10 our workers were in there and
11 wanted to cry when they heard that.

12 Another management member
13 of Aramark when we were talking
14 about paid time off, we get no paid
15 time off, no sick time or anything
16 of that nature, workers come to
17 work sick getting other workers
18 sick. When we were asking this
19 manager how does he feel about
20 that, his response was, I don't
21 know, I get PTO. This is some of
22 the things they say to us.

23 Now, this part here really,
24 really upset us because we've lost
25 a couple workers over these last

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 couple years since the pandemic and
3 they have no health care. We have
4 a worker, I think her surgery is
5 today, she's having a tumor removed
6 from her head. She's getting
7 health care through her brother and
8 she worked for a multi-billion
9 dollar company. When he was told
10 this part, the lawyer said, oh, so
11 what. And you can quote me on
12 that. He said, so what.

13 I mean, that's very
14 disrespectful to the residents of
15 this City and state considering
16 that this is Aramark's home. They
17 just built their headquarters a few
18 years ago here in Philadelphia
19 right across the river. And I'm
20 sure they got a lot of tax breaks,
21 you know, on that building. But
22 they don't care about our workers.

23 And I just want to thank
24 City Council for your support. And
25 at this time, I want you to know

2 that we are fans of the team. I,
3 myself, I travel to a basketball
4 game and a football game every
5 year. My son and I go to a game.
6 We're also going to add baseball
7 this year. But we are fans of the
8 team.

9 But I must announce at this
10 time we will be starting another
11 strike again on Thursday for the
12 playoffs.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Rosslyn
15 Wuchinich, Katie Bartolotta and
16 Harris Metzger.

17 MS. WUCHINICH: Good
18 morning. My name is Rosslyn
19 Wuchinich. I'm the President of
20 UNITE HERE Local 274, the union for
21 the Aramark workers at the three
22 stadiums in South Philadelphia.
23 I'm here to speak in support of
24 Resolution 240295.

25 We want to on behalf of the

2 whole union thank the Council
3 President and Councilmember Harrity
4 and the entire body of City Council
5 for introducing this resolution in
6 support of these brave workers that
7 are fighting for family-sustaining
8 and community-sustaining jobs and
9 health care for all of us.

10 We also want to thank
11 everybody from this body that
12 joined us on our picket line last
13 week and that came to our press
14 conference as well in support. We
15 need your support. Because of the
16 union down in South Philadelphia,
17 we have had tremendous victories
18 over the years. So we have
19 transformed these jobs from
20 seasonal jobs that are only a few
21 months out of the year that cannot
22 sustain a family to year-round
23 jobs, to full-time jobs working for
24 Aramark, a multi-national
25 corporation headquartered here in

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia. And we're proud of
3 that and that has transformed
4 people's lives.

5 However year-round jobs for
6 our members need to look like year-
7 round jobs for everybody else.
8 Just because our membership is
9 majority women, majority Black and
10 Brown, does not mean we deserve
11 anything less from a year-round
12 job. It also means that as
13 Philadelphians we shouldn't be
14 getting anything less than workers
15 in other cities.

16 Workers doing the same kind
17 of work at the United Center in
18 Chicago, when they work 910 hours
19 between the United Center where the
20 Bulls and the Black Hawks play and
21 Wrigley Field, they get free year-
22 round health insurance, but not
23 here.

24 Workers at the Cap One
25 Arena and the United Center, the

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Cap One Arena down in Chicago --
3 excuse me, down in D.C. where the
4 Wizards and the Capitals play,
5 workers in those two places are
6 making -- the lower paid workers
7 right now in 2024 between \$20.50
8 and \$21.55 an hour, and here it's
9 \$6 to \$7 less, so \$14 to \$15 an
10 hour.

11 So we say shame on Aramark.
12 We're thrilled that the Sixers won
13 last night, but we are very, very
14 sad that we are going to have to
15 strike during these playoffs
16 because Aramark can't do what it
17 needs for the City of Philadelphia.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Katie
19 Bartolotta, Harris Metzger and then
20 Tiffany Cherry.

21 (Witnesses approached
22 podium.)

23 MS. BARTOLOTTA: Good
24 morning, Council President and
25 members of City Council. My name

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 is Katie Bartolotta and I'm Vice-
3 president of the Philadelphia
4 Energy Authority. PEA is a quasi
5 governmental entity working to
6 build a robust, equitable, clean
7 energy economy in Philadelphia.

8 We enable energy project
9 development for the City and School
10 District and run a variety of
11 consumer and workforce programs
12 that support the growth of our
13 market and our communities. To
14 date, we have supported over \$900
15 million in energy projects and
16 created over 7600 jobs.

17 I'm here in support of
18 Resolution No. 240284 sponsored by
19 Councilmembers Gilmore Richardson
20 and Gauthier that calls on the
21 Pennsylvania General Assembly to
22 adopt the Solar for Schools Act,
23 and thanks Representative Fiedler
24 for her tireless advocacy in
25 Harrisburg and foresight in

1 04/18/24 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 capitalizing on all of the
3 opportunities solar schools bring,
4 including reducing and stabilizing
5 energy costs for cost-strapped
6 school districts, creating family-
7 sustaining local jobs and
8 leveraging federal tax credits via
9 the Inflation Reduction Act that
10 are available to offset the upfront
11 costs of solar.

12 PEA is excited to continue
13 our long partnership with the
14 District both in supporting clean
15 energy education and providing
16 operational and technical support
17 on solar schools. Over the last
18 four years, we've helped launch a
19 high school career and technical
20 education program that is training
21 Philadelphia's next generation of
22 solar installers and we're excited
23 to add solar training to Mayfair's
24 Middle School Construction CTE
25 Program this school year.

2 Installing solar on schools
3 will create new career
4 opportunities for Philadelphia
5 public school grads, have
6 educational value for current
7 students through curriculum
8 enhancements and connect students
9 to real action for climate change,
10 all while creating jobs for their
11 futures. Philadelphia schools will
12 also save money with solar through
13 lower school bills and long-term
14 budget certainty. Solar is a
15 win-win for Philadelphia schools
16 and school communities in every
17 corner of the Commonwealth.

18 We're grateful to
19 Representative Fiedler for her
20 leadership on solar schools and to
21 Councilmembers Gilmore Richardson
22 and Gauthier for urging the
23 legislature to act. We support the
24 passage of this resolution in City
25 Council. Thank you.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Harris
3 Metzger, Tiffany Cherry and Jeremiah
4 Worsley. Harris Metzger, Tiffany
5 Cherry.

6 MS. CHERRY: Good morning.
7 My name is Tiffany Cherry. I've
8 been a worker at the Bellevue for
9 13 years as a 32BJ SEIU cleaner.
10 Our members also clean the Chambers
11 of Commerce, which is in the same
12 building -- 32BJ has helped us see
13 a steady pay increase under the
14 union contracts. I've gone from
15 \$15 an hour to \$22.

16 One side of the Bellevue is
17 the hotel. The other side is
18 commercial. I work on the
19 commercial side. We went from 10
20 floors of commercial to now only
21 four floors of commercial. Six
22 floors is under renovation to
23 become residential. The Bellevue
24 once had 23 workers. We are now
25 down to 5 workers in the Bellevue.

2 We just recently switched
3 over to a new cleaning company and
4 thanks to the legislation that we
5 have to protect our jobs with
6 switching with their company, we
7 was able to keep our benefits, our
8 pay, our pension where I'm at.

9 However, if the building
10 closed completely for renovations,
11 I would be out of a job all
12 together. I would lose my
13 seniority when it comes time to
14 reapply or when it reopens. The
15 threat of losing our jobs is a
16 threat of losing our wages. It
17 could also lead to us losing our
18 health insurance, our pension, our
19 benefits. These changes are not
20 being made due to our work
21 performance. They are being
22 made -- they are being made based
23 on the circumstances outside of our
24 control, which is why this
25 displaced worker legislation is

2 important for us.

3 If I lose my job, it will

4 affect my life in a major way.

5 Taking care of my children, my

6 bills. We live in the community.

7 We support small business. The

8 passage of this bill not only means

9 job security but also protect our

10 ability to support local economy.

11 The owners of the buildings will be

12 will be taken care of no matter

13 what, however it plays out. We

14 need your help to protect our jobs.

15 We must fight to maintain our

16 rights, wages, working conditions.

17 Thank you for hearing.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremiah

20 Worsley, Barbara Cherry and Daisy

21 Cruz.

22 Is there a Jeremiah

23 Worsley?

24 (No response.)

25 MS. CHERRY: Good morning.

2 I'm Barbara Cherry and I'm a
3 cleaner at the Fashion District at
4 9th and Market. This will be my
5 fifth year in September. Now,
6 after working over 20 years as an
7 educator, I'm close to retiring and
8 I don't want to start over in a new
9 place due to no fault of my own.

10 A lot of people come
11 through the building and tell me
12 what a great job we're doing
13 keeping the building clean. They
14 appreciate coming through a nice,
15 clean place and smells the part.
16 These developers are coming in and
17 trying to wipe out our workforce
18 and our hard-earned benefits.

19 There are many changes
20 happening downtown with buildings
21 being sold or converted into
22 residential. I'm very nervous that
23 if this bill doesn't pass, I could
24 join the growing list of people who
25 have lost their jobs through no

2 fault of their own.

3 Now, we need this bill to
4 be passed to ensure job security
5 and support our families. Some of
6 us have been doing their jobs for
7 over 25 to 30 years. Some of us
8 are close to retirement. Now, our
9 union just negotiated a new
10 contract with a 401(k) and that
11 could just be taken away from us
12 with no fault of our own. Now, we
13 are trying to set a future for our
14 families.

15 Put yourself in our place.
16 How would you feel if you were in
17 our shoes, losing your job and your
18 family's livelihood is destroyed,
19 maybe making less money and you
20 don't have the benefits you worked
21 so hard for, you have to start all
22 over, how would you feel?

23 I just want to leave you
24 with this. With this, our
25 livelihood is riding on this bill

2 to be passed. Just put yourself in
3 our place. What would you do?
4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremiah
7 Worsley, then Daisy Cruz and Frank
8 Lamar Slayton.

9 MR. WORSLEY: Hello. My
10 name is Jeremiah Worsley. I'm a
11 proud member of 32BJ. I've been
12 working in Center City District
13 cleaning the outside of the
14 buildings for 17 years. In that
15 time we negotiated pay raises and
16 maintained great benefits and
17 support for our family.

18 Honestly, the benefits are
19 what keep me here. It take care of
20 my health care as far as my
21 medical, my high blood pressure
22 medicine and make sure my own kids
23 got their own dental. Let me tell
24 you about what being a frontline
25 hero is all about. I worked

2 outside cleaning the buildings, but
3 the threat of getting sick was
4 still very real.

5 We worked during the
6 pandemic. We worked during the
7 riots, cleaning up the glass,
8 everything outside. A lot of the
9 times it felt like nobody cared
10 about us being a frontline worker.
11 To be honest, it was very scary.
12 People was outside. I was scared
13 to get sick. We were wearing
14 masks, but we were still
15 continuously coming to work,
16 maintaining the integrity of the
17 buildings for people to see that
18 downtown was a really good place to
19 be.

20 So I emphasize with y'all
21 to please pass this bill because
22 it's very important to me, my
23 family and all of my members of the
24 32BJ. As people slowly started
25 trickling back into the buildings,

2 our cleaners, guards, they ensured
3 they returned to a very clean
4 environment as far as downtown.

5 We understand that the
6 landscape is changing downtown, but
7 it's essential protecting our
8 workers while that is happening.

9 Let us move forward in a brighter
10 future downtown, especially those
11 who work so hard to keep things
12 together during the tough times.

13 We all deserve a future where we
14 can feel comfortable and retire
15 with our families and everybody.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Daisy Cruz,
19 Frank Lamar Slayton, then Lynn
20 Landes.

21 MS. CRUZ: Good morning.
22 My name is Daisy Cruz. I'm the
23 District leader for SEIU Local
24 32BJ. We represent over 12,000
25 workers in Philadelphia in the

2 tri-state area. Several thousands
3 of them who work in Center City are
4 cleaners, security officers,
5 building engineers and other
6 service workers who ensure that the
7 buildings are secure, clean and
8 well-maintained every single day.

9 Many of these workers are
10 now experiencing a threat to their
11 livelihoods as commercial buildings
12 are being sold and converted.
13 We're here today to ask that you
14 amend the Displaced Contract Worker
15 Protection ordinance and extend job
16 protections to workers when the
17 building changes ownership or
18 closes for renovations or when the
19 work is being brought inhouse.

20 The amendments will require
21 that the new employer to retain the
22 existing workers for 90 days as
23 well as give workers the right to
24 get their old jobs back once a
25 retrofitted building reopens.

2 Contrary to the Chamber of Commerce
3 misinformation campaign, employers
4 will still be able to terminate a
5 worker for just cause or determine
6 that fewer workers are needed.

7 The current ordinance which
8 protects workers only during a
9 contract or switch has been very
10 successful in protecting the good
11 wages and benefits that our members
12 have fought so hard for in their
13 contracts. They've been able to
14 raise their families, pay for their
15 children's schools, buy homes and
16 most importantly support local
17 economy. We need more stability,
18 not less.

19 What we don't need is a
20 revolving door of workers guarding
21 public areas, sanitizing buildings
22 and other crucial services. We
23 must adapt to the changing times of
24 our city and ensure that we close
25 the loopholes that leave thousands

2 of workers vulnerable to be

3 displaced.

4 These amendments are

5 win-win for the public, the workers

6 and the businesses that they serve.

7 We thank you in advance for voting

8 for this bill and sending a clear

9 message that we're all in this

11 you.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Frank Lamar

14 Slayton, Lynn Landes and Daniel

15 Dielle.

16 MR. SLAYTON: Good morning,

17 Mayor Parker, Councilmembers.

18 Thank you for having me. My name

19 is Frank Lamar Slayton. I'm a

20 community activist in the 52nd and

21 Market Street area. And as for --

22 I work in conjunction with Timothy

23 Henry and his mother Geraldine

24 Brown, who is a member of the

25 Philadelphia Police Advisory Board.

2 As for Bill No. 240176, I
3 am in support of that along with
4 the New Age Black Panther Party.
5 We need to bring closure to these
6 mothers. Also, you have
7 individuals who may be incarcerated
8 where forensics may help to
9 exonerate them. We have people who
10 need to know the cause of death for
11 their loved ones.

12 As for resolution 240286, I
13 am in opposition of that. Instead
14 of investing in buildings and
15 infrastructures, I will suggest
16 that we invest in community
17 centers. I spoke with some of the
18 youth in the barbershop in the
19 neighborhood around 52nd and
20 Market. We have an issue with dirt
21 bikes, riding through red lights
22 and things. How about a dirt bike
23 park. It could generate revenue
24 for the City.

25 We have a community center

2 on 51st and Arch that needs to be
3 rehabbed. A brother told me about
4 the Bike Works program after school
5 that was abolished. Bike Works
6 program, we need to bring that back
7 for the youth. Civilian patrols,
8 we have to learn how to patrol
9 ourselves.

10 We have an issue in West
11 Philly. Real quick, we have
12 somewhat like a cult-like following
13 with our youth funded by people
14 impersonating law enforcement
15 officers. I'm bringing it to the
16 floor so you guys can get a
17 headstart. It's funded by former
18 Police Officer Linwood Norman, Big
19 Trey from 7th and Snyder and
20 Mr. James of 109 North 54th Street,
21 they're posing as law enforcement
22 and they're manipulating our youth
23 into crimes of violence.

24 You saw what happened at
25 the Masjid so I'm putting you guys

2 on notice. Okay. We need help out
3 there. They develop a (inaudible)
4 stop the violence. They engaged in
5 artificial intelligence,
6 manipulation of it, tech savvy,
7 very -- and I need help. These

9 type of heinous crimes and I need
10 help out here. Leave the unions
11 alone. We need our unions.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Landes,
13 Daniel Dielle, Jeremy Blatstein.
14 (Witnesses approached
15 podium.)

16 MS. LANDES: Good morning.
17 My name is Lynn Landes of
18 Safestreetsphilly.org. I'm
19 commenting on the resolution to
20 analyze and examine the
21 effectiveness of current policies
22 in Kensington, which is similar to
23 last week's Bill requiring reports
24 on illegal camping.

25 Why are we still studying

2 these things? What is happening in
3 Kensington and other parts of
4 Philadelphia, including my
5 neighborhood, is against the law,
6 and the people doing it generally
7 speaking are the mentally ill and
8 drug addicts. Why are not the
9 police getting these people off the
10 streets and into some sort of
11 mandated care and secure facilities
12 until they are cured, healthier and
13 not violating our laws.

14 More importantly, as the
15 parent of a mentally disabled son,
16 allowing the mentally ill to live
17 on the streets amounts to neglect
18 and abuse of the disabled and is
19 therefore a violation of the
20 American with Disabilities Act.
21 These people need to be in long-
22 term care and in some cases
23 lifetime secure facilities.

24 In many of the reports and
25 discussions about this tragic

2 situation, there is strong support
3 for preserving the privacy of these
4 individuals. Many nonprofits don't
5 take down any personal information
6 if the person is unwilling to
7 provide it. That sounds
8 considerate, but it isn't because
9 many, if not most, of these
10 individuals are mentally ill.

11 So by not identifying them,
12 the City will never know if
13 relatives or friends are looking
14 for them, if they escaped from
15 prison or a mental institution or
16 if they qualify for Social Security
17 disability and other services.
18 Instead and all too often, City
19 agencies and nonprofits enable the
20 homeless to live on the streets
21 instead of providing the mandated
22 care that is actually needed.

23 This is not a complicated
24 situation. The City doesn't need
25 more studies. The City needs to

2 provide more housing for the
3 homeless, build facilities for the
4 mentally ill and drug addicted, and
5 there should be zero tolerance for
6 people living on the streets and
7 breaking the laws of Philadelphia.
8 It's illegal, unhealthy and unsafe
9 for all concerned. Thank you.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Daniel
11 Dielle, Jeremy Blatstein, then Kate
12 Perez. Daniel Dielle.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
15 Blatstein.

16 (Witness approached
17 podium.)

18 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello,
19 Philadelphia City Council.

20 Councilmember President
21 Johnson, where's your boar, but
22 that's beside the point. All
23 right. My name is Jeremy
24 Blatstein. Just to be sure this is
25 not lost on certain well-known

2 publications in this city, I am the
3 nephew of Lee Blatstein, world-
4 renowned urologist in Philadelphia.
5 Let's make the record straight and
6 not publish incorrect facts about
7 me in the paper of record.

8 But I'm here today talking
9 about Bill Nos. 240121 and 240122.
10 Shout-Out Councilmember Squilla. I
11 know he can't do a split, but he
12 knows how to pop some champagne.
13 But everybody should be able
14 by-right to have streeteries.
15 There's no need for these bills to
16 be passed.

17 Shout-out to Councilwoman
18 Rue Landau for having this
19 legislation to be able to have this
20 conversation, but it's not
21 happening quickly enough. So that
22 really needs to happen fast,
23 because these businesses should not
24 have to go through this process to
25 have bills introduced just to be

2 allowed streeteries in front of
3 their restaurants.

4 Shout-out to Councilwoman
5 Gauthier. I know she's enjoying
6 Austria, shout-out to that. But
7 it's the one good thing I guess she
8 has done for her District is
9 allowing it by-right. And the last
10 thing I'll say is about 240287 is
11 my favorite thing, Turn the Key.

12 Stop getting in the way of
13 Turn the Key. Put it on steroids.
14 The average AMI that was just
15 released today by PHDC is the
16 average homebuyer is at 50 percent
17 of AMI. That is with zero taxpayer
18 funding, no direct taxpayer
19 funding. So instead of making it
20 more difficult and trying to get in
21 the way, put the land in the Land
22 Bank, get that land moving and
23 let's start building houses.

24 If housing is the number
25 one priority right now, Turn the

2 Key is a program that will make
3 this work. And as some would say,
4 I'm not a crazy right-winger.
5 Someone said that to me today, so I
6 just want to say thank you for
7 giving me the ability to come here

10 to live. And I think that each and
11 every one of you do as well. Thank
12 you.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Perez.
14 (Witness approached
15 podium.)

16 MS. PEREZ: Enshrining
17 abortion rights is enshrining human
18 rights. We know that banning
19 abortions does not stop abortions,
20 but it stops safe ones. People
21 will go right back to dangerous
22 self-induced abortions and suffer
23 horrific, preventable deaths.

24 Criminalizing abortions
25 also includes language to

2 criminalize those who have
3 stillborns and miscarriages.
4 Miscarriages are an awful,
5 shattering experience for many
6 parents and it's something that has
7 increased 300 percent under Israeli
8 bombing in Gaza.

9 I feel ashamed to be in a
10 country where the House passes a
11 bill to restrict free speech while
12 having some of the worst maternal
13 mortality rates of any first world
14 country. We are remiss to talk
15 about human rights without
16 acknowledging the humans in Gaza
17 who are giving birth in streets
18 overflowing with sewage because
19 Israel bombed all the hospitals and
20 the doctors are reusing scalpels on
21 patients with no anesthesia because
22 Israel blockades the borders.

23 This is in a time where 10
24 children a day are losing limbs to
25 the constant bombardment. With

2 five weapons manufacturers
3 headquartered in our City, we are
4 directly responsible for every
5 death. Abortion rights are human
6 rights. This past week protesters
7 shut down 30th Street, I-76 south
8 and northbound, slowed down traffic
9 on 95 North and South, shut down
10 Market Street and they even shut
11 down City Hall while calling for a
12 ceasefire. What more will it take
13 for you to listen.

14 How many more kindergartens
15 should Israel bomb until you feel
16 like speaking up. Locking the
17 doors and pretending that a
18 genocide isn't happening won't save
19 anyone. Philadelphia has the
20 chance to lead more cities into
21 passing actual ceasefire
22 resolutions. The ethnic cleansing
23 of Palestine could not be happening
24 without the backing of our tax
25 dollars.

2 If we want to acknowledge
3 the genocide, call for a permanent
4 ceasefire. And we need an armed
5 embargo against Israel --

9 abortions more in there as well,
10 maternal rights.

11 MS. PEREZ: All right.
12 Every time we're silent we're
13 saying that it's normal for mothers
14 to carry the flesh of their
15 children in plastic takeout bags
16 because bombs tore their children's
17 bodies apart. Silence is
18 compliance. Ceasefire now.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
21 more names for public comment.

15 community that exists here has so
16 many sources of sustenance from
17 parties to protests and so much
18 more, but I imagine few sparked as
19 much joy as we saw today as the
20 work of Philly's Crown Jewel.

21 Still I want us to remain
22 cognizant of the moment we're in.
23 Beyond the stigma and subtle
24 discrimination that is basically
25 pervasive no matter where you are,

2 it's clear that many LGBTQIA people
3 are under explicit attack around
4 the country and certain parts of
5 this Commonwealth too.

6 Philly for so many is a
7 relatively safe haven as we heard
8 from Ms. Sapphira today and it's on

10 reputation, to earn it every single
11 day, to make law that shapes a city
12 where we have safety, not just that
13 we can see but that we can feel,
14 that when we come to this building
15 week after week, that we're coming
16 to work with intention to create a
17 city, to shape a city in a world
18 really where everybody belongs.
19 They don't have to question that.
20 And I thank again to my colleagues
21 for their participation in this
22 morning's presentation in that
23 spirit.

24 I also recognize the
25 Philadelphia School District's All

3 today. That's because 100 of
4 Philly star student performers
5 graced about two weekends back

14 simply incredible and they should

11 partnership to launch the Impact
12 Center to transform East Tioga and

14 The mission is to provide
15 economic mobility for a diverse

17 transformative services for
18 community well-being. So I'd like
19 for everyone, staff and
20 Councilmembers to join us after
21 session today for Graduate
22 Philadelphia, and also want to
23 thank all of those who came out
24 last week on April 15th for a very
25 robust and fruitful Council in the

3 led by no other, our Council

17 Colleagues, colleagues, I
18 want to alert you to a tip of an
19 iceberg, particularly my At-large
20 colleagues but all my District
21 colleagues as well. There is a --
22 I want you to imagine a place when
23 you were coming up when you were
24 putting your money together early
25 in your life that you said if I

2 just had enough money, I'm moving
3 to this neighborhood.

4 Don't shout it out but
5 think about where that was, and
6 then maybe somewhere along the way
7 that neighborhood changed for the
8 worse. And you said, you know

10 raising my family there. I raise
11 this tip of the iceberg to cite
12 Center City's developers, literally
13 some building owners are throwing
14 back the keys saying, I don't care
15 about the debt, interest rates went
16 up or whatever happened. I'm
17 walking away from this deal.

18 And many of us thought it
19 was just a Center City problem.
20 Tip of the iceberg, it is not. In
21 a bucolic part of the community
22 called Wynnefield Heights, there
23 are several buildings that were
24 established in the '60s, some HUD
25 buildings, some deals that were

2 done.

3 When we were trying to put
4 affordable housing up, these
5 individuals that live there are
6 veterans. They're seniors.
7 They're the handicapped that are in
8 these buildings. And right out of
9 the scene of Casino where they move

11 all the lines of credit, they get
12 all of the loans that they can get
13 on the building and then the fire
14 happens. We're at that point.

15 I talked to you about the
16 Pavilion. I talked to you about
17 Brith Sholom, and there's another
18 building which I will remain
19 nameless because we are working out
20 a deal to try to get transfer and
21 receivership for. But this ain't a
22 4th District problem.

23 If you look around your
24 neighborhoods, you're going to see
25 a chain reaction of these types of

2 developments that walk away. So
3 what is left. Some of these people
4 are stranded and stuck, can't move.
5 These are their familiar
6 surroundings. They know who's on
7 the 5th floor, 7th floor. They
8 know where to get that Friday night
9 meal, hair did, friendly poker
10 game. These are their familiar
11 surroundings. They know the bus
12 routes to their doctors' offices.
13 To disrupt them, to lose them means
14 disrupting their lives at this
15 point in time.

16 Worse, because these
17 investors walk away, took the money
18 out but did not maintain the
19 buildings, major systems are
20 failing. I want to thank Amen
21 Brown, state-repping the 10th
22 District. Before he went to the
23 10th District, the electric went
24 out in one of the buildings. He
25 had to go up like 10 floors. Kathy

2 remembers this. Your staff was out
3 there, right, and helped people
4 down that had walkers with only the
5 use of their cell phone flashlight.

6 So what I'm saying is that
7 we want to help, but it's creating
8 dangerous situations and risking a
9 catastrophe. So now Gas Works
10 wants to cut off these people's
11 gas, half a million dollar bill,
12 because the owners refuse to pay
13 the bills.

14 So what I'm calling is a
15 state of emergency. I'm looking at
16 the tip of the iceberg, and I'm
17 saying to my At-large people, if
18 you've never been to Wynnefield
19 Heights, I'm going to take you up
20 there because they need you. They
21 need your re-assurance that they're
22 going not to wind up the homeless.
23 These people are too elderly in
24 many cases to face this.

25 So we have this much

2 correspondence. This is not coming
3 out of nowhere with this, that
4 we've sent to the last
5 Administration saying, this is
6 coming down the pike, buildings
7 like this around the City are
8 coming offline. We have to
9 establish a mechanism, a blueprint,
10 to deal with these buildings. So
11 if you walk away, who receives
12 them, who takes care of them, who
13 maintains them.

14 We passed the bill in 2021
15 saying that L&I can remediate these
16 buildings because if there's
17 electrical failure, if there's no
18 HVAC, then we can go in and then
19 put liens on these buildings so
20 that when they are sold, we can
21 recoup the City's dollars. But
22 guess what, no money in it.

23 So I'm asking my
24 colleagues, take a look at this so
25 that we can put money to restore

2 these buildings. Right now in one
3 of those buildings there's no
4 security. They walked away. So
5 the drug dealers walked in. Many
6 of these individuals are being
7 captive in their familiar
8 surroundings. So I've called upon
9 a stakeholder's group made up of
10 HUD, made up of the state. My
11 colleagues at the state level are
12 part of it, and the Mayor's Chief
13 housing person John Matlack, I hope
14 I pronounced his name, because we
15 can't kick this can down the road.

16 These are your neighbors,
17 my neighbors. These are your
18 constituents that need to know that
19 you represent them. So as a
20 District Councilperson, I'm all in.
21 I'm on the front line, but I need
22 some help lifting this because it's
23 coming to a neighborhood near you
24 and we need to build a blueprint, a
25 methodology of when people abandon

2 properties, what the City can do to
3 stabilize them.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 Thank you, Member Jones. And also,
8 I'm going to have our Tech Team
9 reach out to you on, one, the
10 Director of the Neighborhood
11 Preservation Initiative which is
12 Janaye Mumford and our new
13 combination of Herb Wetzel and Mike
14 Combst, Nick Dema, who've been
15 around here forever, to be a part
16 of that conversation to help us get
17 to the next level on addressing
18 that particular issue.

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank
20 you, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

22 You're welcome.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilmember Jim Harrity.

3 I want to first start off
4 by saying thank you to the sponsors
5 of the Displaced Workers bill and
6 all my colleagues who voted for
7 this bill. I know there was a lot
8 of questions and it wasn't an easy
9 thing to do. But I'm so proud of
10 this body for voting for the
11 working families of Philadelphia.

12 Philadelphia was one of the
13 first cities to protect dedicated
14 experienced workers from being
15 arbitrarily let go through no fault
16 of their own. The law has been
17 incredibly successful in
18 maintaining a stable work
19 environment for these hard-working
20 women and men so that they can
21 provide for their families, pay
22 taxes, buy homes and contribute to
23 local economy.

24 These amendments adjust to
25 the changing times of our city,

2 protecting essential workers while
3 reducing training and hiring costs
4 for businesses. Again, I just want
5 to thank everybody. And just so
6 everyone knows, that this isn't
7 something I took lightly.

8 I took every comment and
9 every idea under consideration, and
10 I just thank this body for doing
11 the right thing for workers. Thank
12 you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 You're welcome. Good job.

15 Chair recognizes
16 Councilmember Rue Landau.

17 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU: Thank
18 you.

19 Councilmember Harrity, glad
20 to be a part of it. Thanks for
21 doing it.

22 And, Councilmember Jones,
23 we are -- I'm all in on trying to
24 help fix this housing crisis that
25 we see in Philadelphia. And none

2 of it's by accident.

3 I wanted to speak for a
4 moment on our resolution that I
5 introduced with Council President
6 Johnson and with Councilmember
7 Gauthier just recognizing Fair
8 Housing Month. That's April, Fair
9 Housing Month.

10 And we are now
11 commemorating the 56th anniversary
12 of the Fair Housing Act of 1968.
13 So we introduced a resolution that
14 emphasizes the Act's protections
15 against housing discrimination and
16 highlights the urgent importance of
17 protecting our most vulnerable
18 communities and providing equal
19 housing opportunity.

20 Sadly, Philadelphia still
21 suffers from the long painful
22 history of discriminatory laws and
23 policies going back to redlining in
24 the 1930s that made it difficult or
25 impossible for people of color,

2 especially Black applicants, to get
3 mortgage loans as their White
4 counterparts were doing.

5 Today Black homeowners
6 still get denied mortgage loans far
7 more frequently than White
8 homeowners, and this has caused
9 Philly's Black homeownership rate
10 to be declining over the past three
11 decades. What does this all mean?
12 Even with the Fair Housing Act that
13 was passed in 1968 and our local
14 Fair Practice Ordinance law that
15 was passed even before that in
16 1963, we still have a strong racial
17 wealth gap that must be rectified.

18 We must ensure equal access
19 to safe and affordable housing for
20 all individuals regardless of their
21 race, ethnicity, gender, identity,
22 sexual orientation, socioeconomic
23 status or any other protected
24 aspects. So while today we
25 celebrate past achievements in

2 housing advocacy and civil rights,
3 we have to advocate for stronger
4 enforcement and continued expansion
5 of housing protections. This is an
6 emergency.

7 We should not be in this
8 position right now. It has to be
9 urgent. It is a state of emergency
10 in housing. So thanks for this
11 opportunity.

12 And then on a lighter note,
13 I just want to say thank you again.
14 We're so happy to introduce the
15 resolution commemorating Sapphira
16 Cristál on the eve of what we
17 believe will be a victory tomorrow.
18 See you on Broad Street.

19 Sapphira is just absolutely
20 Black queer excellence at its best.
21 I could not be happier to have her
22 in my life, and she has shown with
23 her journey that she exemplifies
24 the power of embracing one's true
25 self without apology, a principle

2 that I wholeheartedly endorse as
3 the first openly LGBTQ
4 Councilperson elected. Today I am
5 honored to recognize her
6 accomplishments. Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

11 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: Thank
12 you, Council President.

13 First, I'd like you all to
14 join me in wishing my legislative
15 Director Mike Cameron a happy
16 birthday. He celebrated yesterday.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA: We
19 had a town hall meeting and
20 everyone was extremely busy and I
21 completely forgot to recognize him
22 on the floor during the session,
23 but I wanted to make sure that he
24 got his shout-out today. Thank you
25 so much. Wishing you many, many

3 And then I'd like to invite

11 youth between the ages of 14 and 24
12 employment opportunities as well as
13 connecting them with colleges and
14 universities. There's going to be
15 resumé writing workshops and
16 interview workshops. And so, there
17 is no excuse for young people to
18 stay home this year. I think that
19 across the City of Philadelphia in
20 collaboration with this legislative
21 body and the Administration we are
22 working very hard to make sure that
23 young people are connected to
24 something positive.

25 And so, I invite all of you

12 Again, everyone is welcome
13 to attend. We will be doing onsite
14 voter registration, updating voter
15 registration and talking to
16 community residents about the
17 importance of their vote. So thank

12 fight crime.

13 These tinted windows are
14 used to conceal identity, allow for
15 a parking ticket to be issued for
16 tinted windows, used to hide
17 identity when speeding, reckless
18 driving, preventing law enforcement
19 from inspecting vehicles and too
20 often far worse.

21 As we know, recently the
22 getaway car used in the Northeast
23 High School shooting where eight
24 children were shot in Councilmember
25 Phillips' District, those children

2 were just trying to get home, but
3 that car had tinted windows. This
4 body must give law enforcement
5 every tool to make it harder to
6 commit crime. Making it easier to
7 enforce tinted windows is another
8 step in the right direction, and I

11 And thank you,
12 Mr. President.

16 Heights. You know I'm born and
17 raised in Wynnefield, have never
18 lived anywhere else. You know we
19 love Wynnefield, and we really have
20 a tremendous opportunity while
21 we're dealing with this challenge
22 around these older buildings that
23 have years and years of deferred
24 maintenance, many that have our
25 seniors and our veterans living

3 And so, I'm all in to work
4 with you, Councilmember Jones, on
5 that very important issue. We have
6 so many seniors that will be
7 displaced. I remember the nights
8 that we were out there in the cold

11 staircases and stairwells. And it
12 was very, very disheartening to see
13 so many seniors be displaced, many
14 of whom do not have family to help
15 them with some of the challenges
16 that living in those buildings
17 bring.

18 And so, I look forward to
19 working with you, with our Council
20 team and also with the
21 Administration to bring resolution
22 to that important issue. And
23 finally, colleagues, I want to
24 remind each of you about our SEPTA
25 briefing at 2:00 p.m. today in the

2 Caucus room, the updated briefing
3 relative to the Bus Revolution
4 Plan.

5 We've had the additional
6 sessions with SEPTA in a variety of
7 our Council districts, including

10 everyone to come to hear about the
11 updated Bus Revolution Plan to
12 bring any additional questions or
13 concerns that you may have so that
14 we can bring a resolution to the
15 Bus Revolution.

16 Thank you, Council

19 You're welcome.

20 There are no more speeches
21 on behalf of the Majority.

22 With that, the Chair


